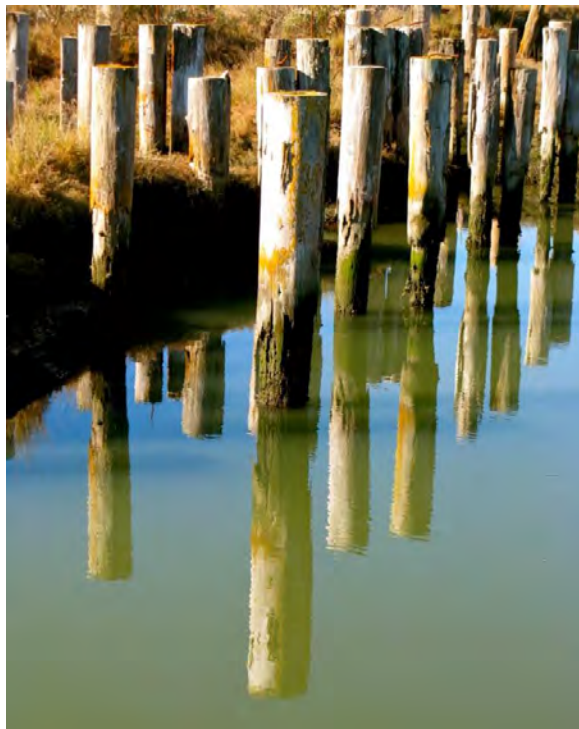

The History of Parks and Recreation in Arcata

In 1968 the Arcata Recreation Commission became the Parks and Recreation Commission, an advisory body to the City Council. In 1976 a full-time Recreation Department Director was hired and in 1977 the Parks Department combined with the Recreation Department to form the Parks and Recreation Department. Due to financial constraints, the Director position was cut from the 1993/94 budgets. At that time, the Parks Superintendent began reporting to the Public Works Director. The Recreation Division Manager reported to the City Manager until November 2000 when the Recreation Division was incorporated into the Environmental Services Department.



Recreation Division

The Recreation Division provides a wide array of programs and services to the public. In addition to supporting our own programs and facilities, the Recreation Office serves as a clearinghouse for information regarding activities and services offered by other City Departments and local service providers. The Recreation Division continues coordinating the city's Special Events and Film Permitting process, Plaza Vending Permit process and introduced the Bayside Park Community Garden application process in 2010.

Programs, Classes and Community Events



The Recreation Division administers many programs, classes, and community events throughout the year. Some of the programs are seasonal, such as Redwood Day Camp, Arts in the Afternoon, and Youth Basketball. Year round programs include Gymnastics, Drop-In Activities, the All Seasons Orchestra, and a wide variety of both youth and adult contract classes. All of our Recreation programs are coordinated by city staff. Additionally, the City of Arcata Recreation Division complies with the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of a disability. Arcata Recreation Division will make reasonable accommodations in recreation programs to enable participation by an individual with a disability who meets essential eligibility requirements. The recreation programs offered by Arcata Recreation are available in the most integrated setting appropriate for each individual.

Recreation Division programs and classes generated \$370,934 in total revenue during 2014. For a financial overview of programs and community events, see Table A. Many children and adults register for classes or programs multiple times throughout the year. In 2012, the Recreation Division introduced online registration to better serve community members. Online registration was utilized in 20% of registration transactions in 2014.

CREATING COMMUNITY



All Seasons Orchestra

The All Seasons Orchestra is comprised of musicians of all ages, ranging from 13 to 79 years old. The Orchestra, which includes string, woodwind, brass, and percussion, rehearses at the D Street Neighborhood Center year round and performs in local concerts that are free to the public. This year the Orchestra performed multiple concerts for audiences ranging from 75-100. The Orchestra played their annual spring concert at the D Street Neighborhood Center on May 4th, a summer concert on July 27th, a concert at the McKinleyville Church of Latter Day Saints on December 13th, as well as a concert at the Fortuna River

Lodge on December 14th. Additionally, one sub-group played at our Holiday Craft Market on December 13th at the Arcata Community Center. The group elects a volunteer coordinator annually and is directed by a volunteer conductor to keep the grassroots atmosphere originally established by the Roddens.

Bayside Park Community Garden

Individuals and families can rent 4 foot by 25 foot garden plots for the purpose of growing organic fruit, vegetables and flowers for non-commercial use. Each plot is rented for \$75 per year for Arcata Residents and \$85 for non-residents. In 2014, plots were rented to 44 gardeners. The final plan, approved by the City's Parks and Recreation Committee, includes 58 plots. The Permaculture Guild also hosts two community beds at the garden to showcase best practices and offer community gardeners information on plants that grow best in our region at different times throughout the year.



Bike Rodeo

On Sunday, May 18th the 8th annual Bike Rodeo was held on the Plaza. The event was made possible through the efforts of 18 volunteers from various community groups. This free event provided children with proper bike safety instruction. Along with general bike safety tips, youth were provided with free bike inspections by 3 volunteer Pacific Outfitters technicians, and helmet inspections by Making Headway, assorted skill building activities, and an interactive "rodeo" course to test their new skills. Additionally, free helmets were distributed. New this year, the Arcata Police Department had two representatives available to do bike licensing. 89 youth participated in the event. Pacific Outfitters donated a bike for raffle with \$96 proceeds benefiting the Youth Development Scholarship Fund.

Bowl of Beans Benefit

The 14th Annual Bowl on Beans benefit took place on Monday, January 20th. This year we had the opportunity to celebrate the renaming of Community Park way to Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway. This event had over 638 participants for an evening of beans, rice, guest speakers, and performances by various musicians. The event was made possible by 200 volunteers including 145 volunteer performers from the

Arcata Interfaith Gospel Choir and Children's Choir, Asha Nan and students from Arcata Elementary School's 4th and 5th grade choir and dance classes. We had an additional 21 volunteers from the Fortuna Center California Conservation Corps crew, US Servas, and the Watershed Stewards Project as well as 30 parents and teachers from Arcata Elementary School. All of which assisted with food prep, set up, served food, and cleaned up after the event was over. Teens from the Arts in the Afternoon program crafted bowls that were sold at the event. This event acts as a shared fundraiser with Arcata Elementary School and was sponsored by the City of Arcata, News Channel 3, and Arcata Elementary School. Revenue from this fundraiser for Arts in the Afternoon totaled \$1,700.

Halloween Carnival

The 14th Annual Halloween Carnival, like previous years, was a very successful event for the Recreation Division. The event was hosted in partnership with HSU Recreation students. Over 412 people attended the event at the Arcata Community Center on Thursday, October 31st. This was a candy free event featuring 15 different game/activity booths. Bananas, oranges and apples were donated by HSU Dining Service and handed out. The event offered a warm, safe and fun alternative to trick-or-treating and was made possible with the assistance of 35 volunteers. This year's carnival featured an Under the Sea theme, which was enjoyed by all. This event raised \$198 for the Arcata Recreation Youth Development Scholarship Fund.



Holiday Craft Market

The 15th Annual Holiday Craft Market was held on Saturday, December 13th and Sunday, December 14th. Handcrafted items were donated by vendors and awarded to 4 lucky raffle ticket winners. City of Arcata employees donated handcrafted items with proceeds benefiting the Youth Development Fund. The market continues to grow in popularity with approximately 1,600 shoppers attending the two-day market. 51 vendors were on hand to share their crafts with the community. Shoppers enjoyed browsing for jewelry, hand crafted clothing, hand-blown glass, puzzles, pottery, and much more. This year's entertainment included volunteer performances including Art Brown, The Mount Bachelor Quintet, Redwood Coast Children's Chorus and Alumni singers, Coastal Grove Violinists and Wally Cooper. In total, we had 48 volunteers help with the event. The proceeds from the event, totaling \$7,043, supported the Arcata Recreation Youth Development Scholarship Fund.



Lemonade Day

On June 7th, 50 local youth participated in a nation-wide event teaching entrepreneurial skills such as how to set business goals, develop a business plan, establish a budget, seek investors, provide customer service, save for the future, and give back to the community. Youth learned the basic principles of business in a hands-on, active way through developing a lemonade stand. The Recreation Division provided participants with a business license for the day.



Plays in the Park

Community theater had a successful return to Redwood Park in August 2014. Plays in the Park, featuring Friday and Saturday evening performances of Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and Susan Pargman's "Scheherazade" ran as a free family friendly Sunday matinee. The productions were put on in collaboration with Sky Clad Theater, a project of the Ink People partnered with the Arcata Recreation Division and the North Coast Repertory Theater.

Ropes Course and Canopy Tours

In 2014 the Recreation Division purchased the Arcata Ropes Course from North Coast Adventure Centers and took on the facilitation of programming. Located at Redwood Park, this course provides the community with a resource for team building, personal development, learning, and expanding one's experiences as an individual or teammate.

In 2014, the city's summer camp programs were able to utilize the Ropes Course for ten weeks over the summer. These camps included the Redwood Day Camp which engaged in 50 courses over 10 weeks serving 1,074 participants, Adventure Camp which served 88 participants once a week for 5 weeks. We continued Community Days to make the Ropes Course more accessible to local community members of all ages. This year we have held one Family Day with 11 participants. Additionally, the Recreation Division coordinated three private ropes courses facilitating a school and community groups totaling 46 participants. In 2014 we led a total of 19 tours serving 1,219 participants.

PROMOTING HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Drop-In Activities

This year, the Recreation Division offered over 25 hours per week of Drop-In programs. Youth and adults participate in basketball, volleyball, table tennis, badminton, bridge, scrabble, song circle, samba drumming & dancing, hula dancing, ukulele club, and a monthly drop-in time for radio controlled indoor flying operators. 11 volunteers facilitated a majority of these programs. The fee structure for this program is \$3 drop-in per day.



Gymnastics

The gymnastics program offers ongoing sessions throughout the year. The Gymini Crickets program, for children 15 months - 6 years of age, is a movement program using gymnastics-related skills and games to encourage the development of social skills, flexibility, strength, and coordination. Classes are held in the Judo Hut. The Artistic Gymnastics program, held at the Arcata Community Center, serves children 6 - 18 years of age. Students are coached through skill progressions developed by USA Gymnastics. To celebrate

and demonstrate all they have learned, gymnasts have the opportunity to participate in our annual winter and spring performances.

Friday Night Flips offers 6-12 year olds an opportunity to drop in and play at the Arcata Community Center Gymnastics Room. In addition, the Saturday morning drop-in program at the Judo Hut continues to gain momentum. There were 1,718 registrants in gymnastics for the entire year. Revenue totaled \$32,960 with net revenue of \$16,678 after deducting payroll, supply, and training expenses.

Junior Sports Club

This sports program offers young children 4-6 years old an introduction to popular sports. Fundamental athletic skills and team play concepts were taught with an emphasis on skill development and having fun.

Pee Wee Sports Camp

This year we offered four weeks of Pee Wee Sports Camp for ages 4 - 6. This very popular camp was held at the Arcata Community Center, 82 children were introduced to the basics of all major sports through games and fun activities.

Special Olympics Tournaments

The Recreation Division partnered with Special Olympics Northern California and Humboldt State University to coordinate the Third Annual Bocce Bonanza for local High School students with differing abilities. This one-day event included 16 four person teams compromised of 64 participants. 12 volunteers made the event a success. Additionally, a March Madness Basketball Tournament was held and involved five schools, competing in team and individual competitions and hosted 55 participants showcasing the talents of 14 volunteers.

Ultimate Frisbee Summer League

An Ultimate Frisbee Summer League was offered again in 2014. The League, which ran six weeks, was comprised of 5 participants playing drop-in games.

Youth Basketball

The Youth Basketball Program served 394 youth between 1st and 12th grade on 41 teams. In all, there were nine divisions, split by age and gender, with a 9th-12th grade boys division. Revenue was generated through registration fees of \$65 per child (\$75 non-resident) and sponsor fees. This season, 20 sponsors donated \$225 each for the privilege of having their name on team shirts and being included in advertising. Net revenue was \$17,218.

The annual "Silent Weekend" took place again this year in an effort to promote positive sportsmanship among spectators. Fans were encouraged to show their support by clapping while refraining from all verbal cheering.



Each team practiced weekly at the Arcata Community Center and played games every Saturday throughout the nine-week season. In addition to the Arcata Community Center; Jacoby Creek School, Pacific Union

School and Sunny Brae Middle School were used for the games. The Recreation Supervisor serves as the program coordinator and supervised 24 paid staff and 46 volunteer coaches.

Youth Volleyball

With classes divided into two groups, 5th - 6th graders and 7th - 9th graders, 57 participants learned proper techniques and improved current skill levels for a total of 12 classes. This program was facilitated in collaboration with Arcata High School Volleyball Coaches.

FOSTERING YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Adventure Camp

This camp serves 10 to 14 year old adventure seekers and was held during five weeks this summer. Camp themes included Wilderness Survival, Tracking, Navigation and Orienteering, Fire Safety and Cooking, and Adventure Prep. These themed weeks focused on camper skill development in shelter building, knots, mountain biking, hiking, track identification, compasses, maps, GPS, fire building, camp safety, backpacking, and first aid. This summer Adventure Camp participants were also able practice and refine mountain biking skills with local skilled cyclist from Adventure's Edge.



Arcata Break Camps

For the Fifth year the Division offered camps during school breaks. An art centered camp, for kindergarten through sixth graders, was held during Thanksgiving, Winter, Presidents week and Spring Break at the Teen Room in the Arcata Community Center. The camp was offered as half-day (9am – 1pm or 1pm-5pm) or full-day (9am – 5pm), with extended care starting at 8am and ending at 5:30pm at no additional charge. The Division offers a drop-in, pay by the day, option as well. This successful camp had a total of 220 registrants, participating in daily directed art lessons, games and activities.

Art Camp/Young Creators Art Camp

Art Camp provided fun art experiences for youth ages 7-14 years. This year the camp was hosted at the Arcata Community Center. This camp is a fun and supportive environment for youth to explore their creativity. Six weeks of camp were offered with 155 children attending throughout the summer. Two Co-Directors worked to create a fun atmosphere where kids worked on a variety of art projects that included watercolor, paper making, and marble paintings.



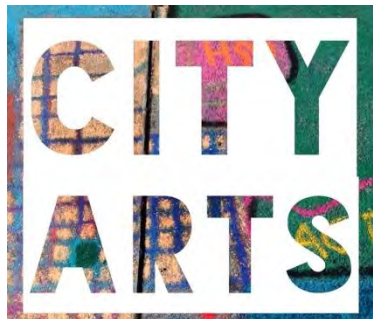
This summer we offered three weeks of Young Creators Art Camp. Young Creators is an art camp specific for ages 4-6 years. 65 participants learned basic drawing techniques and created many crafts.

Birthday Parties

The Division hosted four Art, four Sports, 32 Gymnastics birthday parties this year. Two staff members supervise games, crafts and activities during a two-hour party. The Recreation Division provides the facilities, supervision and fun, while the parent supplies the guests and refreshments. We offer families birthday celebrations with no stress and no mess.

City Arts

During 2014 City Arts programming included Arts in the Afternoon an afterschool program designed to provide a positive and productive space for youth in 6th - 12th grades during the afterschool hours. Arts in the Afternoon offers an art studio where participants receive instruction in a variety of art mediums



including ceramics, painting, collage, sewing, drawing, and culinary arts as well as involvement in community events. In 2014, Arts in the Afternoon continued to work with several non-profits (Starfish Heroes, Multiplicity and Inclusive Education and Community Partnership) providing support services for students with special needs.

In addition to Arts in the Afternoon City Arts hosted workshops included sewing, ceramics and graham cracker holiday houses for youth ranging from ages 4-13.

Four individuals volunteered their time and talents to City Arts in 2014. \$1,799 was received from the Humboldt State Work-Study Program.

Dance Camp

Open to dancers of all levels, 106 campers were able to experiment with different dance styles while working on core competency at the Redwood Lounge in Redwood Park. Six week sessions of Ballet, Jazz, World, Hip Hop and Street Jazz were provided. Each week concluded with a Friday All Camp Performance.

Leader-In-Training

Leaders-In Training work with youth ages 4-12, helping plan and lead activities, games, fieldtrips, and more. LITs earn community service hours while acting as role models to our campers. Teens leave the program with job experience, professional references, and a summer of positive memories. All summer camps utilized the help of Leaders-In-Training. A total of 148 registrants, ages 13 – 17 years of age, gained first hand work experience through the Leader-In-Training program.



Marsh Camp/Young Explorers Camp

For the fourth year two camps were offered at the Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center. Themes focused on the marsh habitat. Three weeks of Young Explorers Camp was offered for 4 – 6 year olds as well as four week of Marsh Explorers Camp for youth 7 – 9 years totaling seven weeks. 136 youth investigated the natural world through experiments, individual projects and engaging science learning.

Natural Resources Science Camp



This summer, five weeks of Natural Resources Science Camp were offered for 96 youth ages 9 - 12 years of age. Each week had activities and field trips that focused on a theme of Forestry, Aquatics and Fisheries, Wildlife, Alternative Energy, Air and Space, and Sustainable Agriculture. The camp takes place at HSU and is highly collaborative with local organizations and agencies that contributed their time and energy to make the camp a success. These organizations and agencies include Friends of the Dunes, Friends of the Arcata Marsh, Green Diamond Resource Company, the Redwood Sciences Lab, the Potawot Indian Health Village, Mad River Fish Hatchery and many more.

Play Center

In partnership with First 5 Humboldt, the Arcata Play Center offered a safe comfortable environment for families to meet and share parenting and play experiences with their infants and children up to five years of age. Play Center meets at the D Street Neighborhood Center on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 10am - 12pm. A \$3 daily drop-in donation per child is requested, but not required, to attend Play Center. Throughout the year, families were provided with workshops addressing nutrition, car seat safety, parenting support and developmental stages. Regularly scheduled field trips and visitors are planned throughout the year. This year Play Center had two HSU student volunteers. Play Center averages over 49 participants each day. The city also continued partnering with Food for People to include a daily snack offering free to participants.

Redwood Day Camp

The Recreation Division finished another year of Redwood Day Camp on a very successful note. Full-day and half-day spots were available. The fee for full-day camp was \$130/week (\$140 non-resident), and \$95/week (\$105 non-resident) for half-days. A total of 1,074 youth participated in a number of daily activities including arts & crafts, games and fieldtrips. Redwood Day Camp also held two overnights at Redwood Park serving 48 youth on July 11th and Aug 1st.

The City of Arcata again offered low element Ropes Course activities one day a week for the ten weeks of Redwood Day Camp. In addition children had an opportunity to swim weekly at the Arcata Pool and also go on fieldtrips to places like The HSU Marine Lab and Trinidad State Beach, Sequoia Park Zoo, and, and the Natural History Museum. We continued to provide camp T-shirts that were worn on fieldtrips to help identify campers.

Redwood Day Camp also serves as a distribution site for the USDA and Department of Education's Summer Food Service Program. A total of 530 lunches were served, free of charge, to local youth. Not only does Redwood Day Camp provide affordable summer care for working parents, the program also employed twelve full-time seasonal staff.

Skate Camp

Skate Camp was offered to youth of all skill levels to learn how to be safe and have fun at our local skate park. Instructed by our partners at AMPT Skate Shop, this program focused on park safety, etiquette, street and vert riding, and style. 115 youth strengthened their skills during five week-long sessions. A highlight for the camp this summer was several opportunities to skate at RampArt, the community's first indoor skate park.



Student Government Day

In partnership with Arcata High School the Recreation Division hosted a "mock" Council Meeting led by Arcata High students and held in the Council Chambers on Wednesday, February 26. 16 students joined Council Members and city staff to explore options for addressing traffic safety concerns at the Sunset Avenue overcrossing. The Mayor gave a welcome and overview regarding the role of the City Council and how public policy impacts our community, Council Members and city staff sat with their student counterparts to offer guidance and support and the meeting was filmed so that the class could watch themselves in action.

Contract Classes

A number of classes are offered through the Recreation Division on a contract basis. Contractors plan, organize, supervise the classes, and receive 60-70% of the revenue and is responsible for any expenses associated with the class. The revenue retained by the Division is used to offset the cost of advertising, facility use, registration, and administration. See Table A for more details.

Contract Classes continue to make up a large portion of our class offerings with 1,223 participants for the year. Total revenue for the year was \$36,399. Net revenue, after paying instructors 60-70% of class fees, was \$12,113. Hot Stone Yoga and Wae Yu Nae Gong were newly offered in 2014.

Participant Demographics

A total of 2,180 adults and children participated in a class or program offered through the Recreation Division in 2014. This does not include adults who participate in Drop-In Activities, local team sports, and spectators. Many people register for more than one class or multiple sessions of the same class. For this reason, the number of service units is much higher than the number of individuals who participated. Participants were predominately female residents this year. Table B has a complete breakdown of participants.

Youth Development Scholarship Fund

The Youth Development Scholarship Fund provides fee reductions to youth from low-income families. The fund relies solely upon grants, donations, and fundraisers to provide this invaluable service to the community. In 2014 we committed to providing 30% fee reductions to all youth of qualifying families for programs attended throughout the year.

During 2014, 456 scholarships were awarded for classes, programs, and camps providing a total of \$13,416 in assistance. These children attended Gymnastics classes, Summer Camps, Youth Basketball, Arcata Break Camp and Youth Contract Classes. Donations of \$4,121 were received from Humboldt Sponsors, Humboldt Area Foundation, Six Rivers Bocce Club and local residents. The Recreation Division hosted two fundraisers; The Halloween Carnival and the Holiday Craft Market, which together generated \$7,241 for the Youth Development Scholarship Fund.

Personnel

The Recreation Division employed 102 people in 2014. This included four full-time positions, one three-quarter time positions, 97 part-time staff, twelve Recreation Interns (from Humboldt State University – one Business Major, one Social Work, three Recreation Administration Major, two Wildlife Biology and Conservation Major, one Interdisciplinary Studies, three Environmental Management and Protection Major and one Natural Resources Post-Graduate Certificate Program), and twelve contract class instructors. We also had 420 volunteers in programs such as, Youth Basketball, Drop-In Activities, Bike Rodeo, Halloween Carnival, Holiday Craft Market, Bowl of Beans Benefit, City Arts and Play Center.

Parks and Facilities Division

The Parks and Facilities Division is responsible for the design, development, landscaping and maintenance of Arcata City parks and facilities. The Division maintains 30 open spaces totaling 106 acres of community parkland and open space. This system includes neighborhood and community parks, 15 playgrounds, nine athletic fields, special use and linear parks (tennis, skateboarding, bocce, pickle ball, greenways), non-motorized trail systems, family picnic areas, community gardens and farm, the downtown Plaza and undeveloped open space. Appendix 2 lists each City Park and its amenities. This year the Parks Division attained a new park and pedestrian easements, Carlson Pak, in the Mad River Business Park Development. This park will eventually have trail access to the Mad River.

Additionally, the Division cleans and/or maintains the landscaping of City buildings, parking lots, pedestrian corridors, roadway and sound-wall landscaping and vegetation management. Vandalism clean up and repair also falls to the Parks and Facilities Division. The cost of vandalism repair totaled \$23,100 in 2014 (See Appendix 3 for a complete listing).



The Parks & Recreation Divisions share the responsibility of renting City facilities and supporting community events, activities and tournaments. The Parks and Facilities Division maintains, prepares and supports the buildings, parks and sports fields and the Recreation Division schedules events and rentals.

Parks and Fields

In addition to the on-going and regular maintenance of our parks, sports fields, landscape areas, buildings and equipment, the Parks and Facilities Division successfully participated in the completion of several capital projects. These included:

- Renovation of Rotary Park
- Completion of Ballpark Outfield Netting

Field Rentals and Use

This year, we were able to accommodate 2,797 hours of the requested 2,797 hours of field time. See the table below for a breakdown of field reservation requests. Often groups call in to check availability prior to submitting a written request and are informed that it is already scheduled. This unmet need is not reflected in the table below. There were 206 hours of rainouts. Therefore, the total field reservation hours for 2014 were 2,591. For complete information regarding field reservations and use refer to Appendix 4.

The Parks Division maintains nine sports fields that are used by a variety of groups for practice, tournaments, and league play in softball, baseball, soccer, lacrosse, ultimate frisbee and tennis, pickle ball and bocce courts. The City operates four baseball/softball fields: The Arcata Ball Park, Sports Complex North and South and Pacific Union Park. Multi-use fields include the Pacific Union Field (two “under 12”/one full size soccer) and the Sports Complex (two full-size fields/one “under 12”).

Many organizations use the fields maintained by the City. User groups include: the Humboldt Crabs, Humboldt B-52's, Arcata High School (AHS), Humboldt State University (HSU), College of the Redwoods, Mad River Softball Association (MRSA), Arcata Little League (ALL), Senior Softball, Special Olympics, Humboldt Soccer League (HSL), Slugger Baseball, Football Club Samoa, USTA/Humboldt Tennis, US Coast Guard, Temple Beth El, North Coast Preparatory Academy, Mad River Girls Fast Pitch Softball Association(MRGFSA), Humboldt Renegades, Pacific Union School, Jacoby Creek School and Mad River Youth Soccer League (MRYSL) ., AC Samoa,.

Revenue for field use totaled \$67,302. The most heavily used season was Summer, followed by Fall, and then Winter/Spring. Refer to Table G for more details.

Buildings

There are seven buildings available for rent through the City: The Arcata Community Center, Redwood Lodge, Redwood Lounge, Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center, D St. Neighborhood Center, the Library Conference Room and the Judo Hut. The Parks and Facility Divisions, in addition to handling all maintenance of these buildings, are responsible for maintenance of City Hall, the Library, Transit Building, Arcata Resource Center and Public Works Annex.



Building projects for 2014 included:

- Community Center – replace gymnasium doors (10), exterior arbor
- D St. Center – Painting interior/exterior, Audio/video enhancements
- City Hall – Developed plans for remodel and HVAC/energy efficiency improvements

Building Rentals and Use

During 2014, city buildings were used for a total of 14,644 hours. Over 38,907 people attended events held at the Arcata Community Center, Redwood Lodge, Library Conference Room, Redwood Lounge, Larson Park Gazebo, the D St. Neighborhood Center, the Judo Hut and the Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center. Revenue generated from these building rentals totaled \$62,826. Building rentals accounted for 2,014 hours of use. City programs and events used the facilities 11,399 hours. The Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center was open for 2,760 hours. Table C shows the number of hours each facility was used and the revenue generated from building rentals. For a complete breakdown of facility use by building, see Appendices 5-9.

Arcata Community Center

The Arcata Community Center was the site for many programs, activities, and community rentals this year.



Throughout the year the facility was scheduled for 7,683.5 hours of use. Of that, 921 hours were for community events such as wedding receptions, graduation parties, and fund-raisers for local non-profit agencies. Net rental revenues totaled \$47,027 for the year. The Recreation Division held 3,761 hours of classes or programs while other departments and joint use partners used the building 75.5 hours for meetings. The Senior Resource Center scheduled 2,007 hours of activities. This includes the lunch program, exercise classes, Tai Chi, site counseling,

health screenings, movies, and card games. See Table D, for a breakdown of the hours used by facility users.

Personnel

The Parks and Facilities Division had ten full-time and 5 part-time (FTE employees). In addition, over 100 people volunteered with the Adopt-A-Park Program, California Conservation Corps Youth Workability Program, HSU and several volunteer groups used for ongoing maintenance and community beautification projects.

Special Events



Special Events are community-coordinated events that take place at City parks and facilities. Special Event Permits are required for any event that uses a city park or requires road closures or extra city services. Since November 2006, the Recreation Division Office has been handling the permitting process for the City of Arcata. Many events raise funds for local causes, non-profit agencies, or unique community needs. In addition to raising funds, special events, like Godwit Days and Kinetic Sculpture Race, give Arcata its unique flavor and attract many visitors annually.

While the Recreation Division is responsible for processing the permits, reviewing scheduled use of buildings, and coordinating park use, many other departments provide support for these events. The Parks Division is responsible for facility and park preparation, coordination of sound, electrical and water use, and facility/park clean up. The Public Works and Environmental Services Departments provide fencing and barricades for street closures. The Police Department may step up patrols in neighborhoods or in some cases actually assign officers to events.

In 2014 approximately 94,705 people attended 124 Special Events based on estimates provided by event coordinators during the application process. The actual attendance of special events may be closer to 120,000 because often times the coordinator will underestimate attendance numbers. Special Event Fees totaled \$12,425. See appendix 10 for a complete list of all Special Events in 2014.

Film Permits

Since 2006, the Recreation Division Office has been handling the citywide film permitting process for the City of Arcata. There was one request for film permits in 2014. This permit generated \$150 in revenue. See appendix 11.

Plaza Vending

Three Plaza Vending spaces became available for the first time in 2009. Plaza Vending revenue for 2014 was \$2,232. Feedback for the Plaza Vending program has been positive from both vendors and citizens. This program helps local start-up businesses by providing affordable rental spaces directly on the Plaza. Sublime Swine, for example, became successful enough to move to a permanent storefront on the Plaza and opened as Luke's Joint and has since opened an additional establishment in Arcata, The Other Place.

Bayside Park Farm

The Bayside Park Farm is the first CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) in Arcata, providing the surrounding community with local and organic produce for 21 years. The farm is funded by the community; shareholders pledge their support in the spring and receive a share of the harvest every week for the growing season. As well as being a running CSA, the Bayside Park Farm is a perm-culture park, demonstrating sustainable farming practices and appropriate means of energy use. Over the years, this farm has been managed by many generations of student farmers. Many notable farmers have learned to farm at Bayside Park Farm.

In 2014 the Farm supported 24 shareholders through the growing season (June through October) Also, a share was traded to Cory Lewis, who writes a yearly grant for the farm to secure soil amendments. The farm also had 20 "Winter You- Pick" shareholders (November through February).



In 2014 the Farm had 15 Interns that volunteered over 2,000 hours of service. Drop-in volunteer hours were expanded to 2 days a week, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, 2-5pm (May-October). Most volunteer afternoons there were an average of 10 volunteers, some days as many as 15 community members. In addition, the Farm hosted a garden herb walk, 5 community events, and provided tours for 12 local organizations. One local school participated in 15 weekly field trips to the farm. Also, the Director of the Bayside Park Farm participated in the Farmer in the Classroom program and made four visits to local elementary schools. During Humboldt Green Week, the Farm participated in an educational presentation with a local playgroup. Also, the Director gave presentations about sustainable practices at the farm to 2 HSU classes. "Healthy Snack Wednesdays" continued this year with the Farm delivering \$2 individual snack bag of vegetables for employees to purchase and enjoy at City Hall (May-mid-October). The farm was also able to donate 150 lbs. of produce to Food For People, the local food bank. Other donations went to CCAT, Food Not Bombs, the Arcata AIDS Project, 2 different benefits for ailing community members, and the Crab-n-Drum Epic Fundraiser.

Grants and Donations

Collaborations and Community Partners

The success of many recreation and park activities would not be possible without assistance from community partners who are willing to take the risk of both succeeding and/or failing with us. During 2014, the Parks and Recreation Divisions partnered with the following organizations:

Adopt-A-Park Program

Through the Adopt-A-Park program, community members and service groups can volunteer their time and resources to perform weekly clean-up, exotic species removal, tree planting, painting, building maintenance, and landscape beautification. All City parks are included in this program.

Adventure's Edge

Adventure's Edge collaborates with the City to provide mountain biking instruction in riding techniques, bicycle maintenance, biking safety and trail etiquette to Adventure Campers during the summer months.

AMPT Skate Shop

Ampt Skate Shop partners with the City to staff, sponsor and provide protective gear for youth during Skate Camp sessions at the Arcata Skate Park.

Arcata Elementary School District

Arcata Elementary School District continued to be a strong supporter of Recreation Programs. They allow us to utilize their gymnasium for Youth Basketball when necessary. Sunny Brae Middle School held their eighth grade graduation ceremonies for the tenth year and a talent show at the Arcata Community Center. The Recreation Division partners with Arcata Elementary to host the Annual Bowl of Beans Fundraiser. In addition, Arcata Elementary utilized the D Street Neighborhood Center for events such as the Raffle, Art, Dessert, and Dance gathering in April and a talent show held in May. The Arcata Community Center also held the school's Winter Holiday Performance in December.

Arcata Chamber of Commerce

The Arcata Chamber of Commerce put on the 4th of July Jubilee event on the Plaza.

Arcata Economic Development Corporation

Arcata Economic Development Corporation provides Arcata youth with entrepreneurial resources to develop and implement a business plan for a lemonade stand operated during the annual nation-wide Lemonade Day.

Arcata Mainstreet

We continue to coordinate both Halloween and Winter Holiday events with Arcata Mainstreet. Additionally, Arcata Mainstreet showcases the plaza annually with the Oyster Festival which brings over 12,000 people to the plaza each year.

Art Around Arcata

Art Around Arcata, Arcata's public art program, strives to provide the opportunity for the public to experience high quality art of enduring value that reflects the diversity of the region. In contrast to the benefits that come from this program, the cost to the city is very low. Artists and donors are responsible for the creation, installation, and maintenance of any piece donated to the program.

California Conservation Corp

The California Conservation Corp assisted Park staff with plantings and invasive species removal.

Community Supported Activities

The Recreation Division hosts several different Community Supported Activities; Bridge, Samba Drumming, RC Model Airplane Flying, Scrabble, Table Tennis, Hula, Ukulele and a Community Song Circle. These groups meet on a weekly basis and allow players and singers of all ages and skill levels to participate. Very dedicated volunteers staff the activities; therefore, we are able to offer these programs for a minimal drop-in fee.

First Five Humboldt

First Five Humboldt provides funding, educational and training resources, parent workshops and program staff support for the Arcata Play Center.

Fire Arts Center

City Arts programming is supported by the Fire Arts Center through the generous donation of bowls sold at the annual Bowl of Beans Benefit.

Friends of the Arcata Marsh

Friends of the Arcata Marsh assisted in facilitating learning activities and program tours for Natural Resources Science Camp and the Marsh Camps in 2014.

Food For People Inc.

The Recreation Division was fortunate to partner with Food for People to supply daily snack items for the Arts in the Afternoon program and lunches were available again during the summer at Redwood Park. The lunches supplied by Food For People and served by City of Arcata Recreation staff were available to any child in our community. 530 lunches were served over ten weeks of the summer. New in 2014 Food For People provided weekly snacks for Play Center participants. 1,162 juice and snack combo items were served in 2014.

Humboldt County Office of Education

A group from the Humboldt County Office of Education assists with the maintenance of the City Hall parking lot, planters and roundabouts. Additionally, the Recreation Division partnered with HCOE to update and showcase local quests through the Redwood Edventures Program.

Humboldt Crabs

The Humboldt Crabs continue their partnership with the City of Arcata assisting with the support of capital improvement projects. This year, the Humboldt Crabs had over 30,000 attendees.

Humboldt Permaculture Guild

The Humboldt Permaculture Guild supports permaculture in the Redwood Bioregion through planting and maintaining two demonstration plots at the Bayside Park Community Garden and offering workshops to local community gardeners.

Humboldt State University

The HSU Sierra Club/ Natural Resources Club continued their involvement at Sunny Brae Park performing trail renovation, tree planting, and exotic species removal. Our partnership with the Recreation Administration Department provides internships and special projects. The Natural Resources Science Camp also utilized HSU extensively. The Natural Resources building acted as the home base for the camp and many other facilities were utilized for enrichment and education opportunities.

Jacoby Creek School

Jacoby Creek School provides gymnasium space for recreation basketball and other programs throughout the year. They are very helpful and flexible in the scheduling of the facility as we each work towards maximizing gym use during peak seasons. The cross country/track teams at Jacoby Creek School use fields at the Arcata Sports Complex for practices throughout the year and for the County Cross Country Championship in October. Additionally, the boys and girls basketball teams have used the Arcata Community Center throughout the year for practices and occasional tournaments.

Native Plant Society

Volunteers continue to maintain the landscaping along the 7th Street walkway leading to the Arcata Community Center.

North Coast Community Garden Collaborative

The collaborative operates as a support network of and for community gardeners on California's north coast. The North Coast Community Garden Collaborative (NCCGC) works to bring community partners, gardens and gardeners together to improve access to affordable, healthy, fresh and culturally appropriate foods. NCCGC develops and delivers a monthly newsletter and provides community gardeners with opportunities for garden gatherings, educational events and sharing of resources.

Pacific Union School District

Since completing the renovation of Pacific Union Park, our relationship with the PUSD has remained positive. The Recreation Division is fortunate to receive time in the Pacific Union school gym for our basketball program and in turn Pacific Union used the Arcata Community Center for their awards night as well as graduation. The Pacific Union Field is also utilized for Physical Education classes and PUSD host a cross country race at the Marsh annually.

Plaza Garden Club

Through the Adopt-A-Park program, The Plaza Garden Club is responsible for the planting and maintenance of all the Plaza flowerbeds.

RampArt

RampArt, the community's first indoor skate park, makes their space available for Skate campers during inclement weather.

SCRAP Humboldt

SCRAP Humboldt partnered with City Arts for numerous projects throughout the year donating supplies, inspiring ideas and hosting students at their site.

Senior Resource Center

The Senior Resource Center utilizes the Arcata Community Center to serve daily lunches and provides social activities to seniors. Additionally, various rooms in the Arcata Community Center are utilized for weekly senior exercise and health screenings.

Six Rivers National Forest Service

Six Rivers National Forest donated over \$750 in supplies for Natural Resources Science Camp in 2014.

Special Olympics of Northern California

Special Olympics partnered with the Recreation Division to host the Annual Bocce Bonanza for local High School students with differing abilities at the Larson Park Bocce Courts and the March Madness Basketball Tournament at the Arcata Community Center.

United States Tennis Association

The USTA is the national governing body for the sport of tennis.

- ◆ Complete a draft of the Parks and Recreation Element of the General Plan for Council and the Planning Commission to review.
- ◆ Master Planning for Redwood Park.
- ◆ Assist in identification of potential sites for dog parks and/or leash free areas within existing City properties.
- ◆ Community planning, fundraising and construction of Greenview Park playground.
- ◆ Continue to establish a stronger relationship with the Forest Advisory, the Open Space and Wetland and Creeks Advisory Committees.
- ◆ Develop and implement plans to access the Mad River from Carlson Park.
- ◆ Review opportunities to maintain and develop undeveloped parklands and trails.
- ◆ Continue to implement park and playground safety audit/inspection recommendations and improvements.
- ◆ Complete improvements to Valley West neighborhood playground.
