RECREATION DIVISION

The Recreation Division provides a wide array of public recreational programs and community events throughout the year. In addition, the Recreation staff coordinates the City's Special Events, Film, and Plaza Vending Permits and the Bayside Park Community Garden applications and Farm Shares as well as overseeing the Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center programming and staff.

Recreation Division staff is responsible for all City facility and field rentals including the Arcata Community Center, D Street Neighborhood Center, Redwood Lodge and Lounge, Redwood Park Picnic area, the Arcata Ballpark and Sports Complex, Pacific Union Field, Larson Park tennis courts, bocce ball courts and gazebo, and Library Conference Room.

The Division also serves as a clearinghouse for information regarding activities and services offered by other City Departments and local service providers. The Recreation Division employs four full-time and numerous part-time staff. Community volunteers support City programs including Youth Basketball, Drop-In Activities, Community Events, Bayside Park Farm and Play Center.

Programs, Classes, and Community Events



The Recreation Division offers both seasonal programs such as Summer Camp and Youth Basketball as well as year-round programs including Gymnastics, Ceramics, Play Center, Drop-In Activities, and a variety of contract classes.

The City of Arcata Recreation Division complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), which prohibits discrimination based on a disability. The Recreation Division makes reasonable accommodations in recreation programs to enable participation by individuals with a disability who meet essential eligibility requirements. Recreation programs offered by Arcata Recreation are available in the most integrated setting appropriate for each individual.

Recreation Division programs and classes generated \$328,986 in total revenue during 2024. Many children and adults register for classes or programs multiple times throughout the year. Since its inception in 2012, online registration continues to be well utilized.

Creating Community

Bayside Park Community Garden

Individuals and families can rent 4x25-foot garden plots to grow organic fruit, vegetables, and flowers for non-commercial use. Each plot rented for \$100 per year for Arcata Residents and \$113.50 for non-residents. There are 36 garden plots and they were all rented in 2024.



Kid's Bike Rodeo

In 2024, the Annual Arcata Kid's Bike Rodeo was cancelled due to Recreation Division and Engineering Department lack of staff capacity and our department's focus on other projects. The Kid's Bike Rodeo will return in May of 2025 for Bike Month Humboldt.

Challenge Course

Located at Redwood Park, the course is a community resource for team building, personal development, and challenging one's experiences as a leader or teammate. In 2024, we hosted Seaforth Montessori and led about 30 of their students through the course.

Holiday Craft Market

The 23rd Annual Holiday Craft Market was held on Saturday, December 14 and Sunday, December 15. Hand crafted items were donated by vendors and awarded to lucky raffle ticket winners. Approximately 1,750 community members attended the two-day event. Shoppers enjoyed browsing for jewelry, hand crafted clothing, hand-blown glass, puzzles, pottery and much more. This year's entertainment showcased five volunteer music performances. The proceeds from the event, totaling \$8,833, supported the Arcata Recreation Youth Development Scholarship Fund.

PROMOTING HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Drop-In Activities

This year, Recreation Division Drop-In programs averaged 374 participants monthly, an increase from 223 last year. Youth and adults participated in basketball, volleyball, table tennis, badminton, pickleball, hula dancing, song circle, and ukulele. Arcata Community Center employees oversee most programming at this facility with some support from City volunteers for table tennis, hula dance and ukulele club. The fee is \$3 per drop-in session or participants can purchase a \$20 punch card good for 10 sessions.

Gymnastics

The Arcata Recreation Gymnastics program offers an affordable, high-quality program to youth ages 5-12yrs. Students are coached through skill progressions developed by USA Gymnastics. The program typically offers six sessions throughout the year with four different levels of classes. During 2024, we served 269 gymnasts, most enrolling in multiple sessions.

Special Olympics Tournaments and Young Athletes Program

In Fall of 2024, in collaboration with Special Olympics of Northern California and Arcata High School, the Special Olympic Bocce Tournament returned to Larson Park. Throughout the day there were about 150 participants, spectators, teachers and volunteers from Fortuna High, Eureka High, McKinleyville High, and Arcata High School. There were a total of 38 rounds of bocce played between 19 different teams.

Youth Basketball

The Arcata Youth Basketball League enrolled 346 participants in the 1st-6th grades on 36 teams. In all, there were 6 divisions split by grade and gender. The program hired 15 part time staff during the season as referees and scorekeepers, three building supervisors were used to support the facilities, and brought on 62 volunteers consisting of parents and community members to help coach each team, some teams having both head and assistant coaches.

Registration fees of \$85 per player (\$98.50 non-resident) and \$325 sponsor fees provide the revenue for this program. The program had a total revenue of \$36,650.

Sponsors are recognized through having their name on team shirts and advertising in return for a plaque with team photo.

All teams practice weekly at the Arcata Community Center and play games every Saturday. In addition to the Arcata Community Center, Jacoby Creek School and Sunny Brae Middle School were used for games, using about 6 hours of gym time at Jacoby creek and about 30 hours at Sunny Brae Middle School.



FOSTERING YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Adventure Camp

Adventure Camp continued to be a top choice for campers seeking outdoor excitement and hands-on learning. Running for nine weeks in the summer of 2024, the camp nearly reached capacity each week, with a total of 170 enrollments.

Each themed week was designed to build practical outdoor skills through activities like shelter building, knot tying, hiking, and orienteering. Campers also learned about track identification, fire safety, basic first aid, and orienteering. The experience was rounded out with games, scavenger hunts, and camper-led skits—bringing creativity and camaraderie into every week.



Arcata Break Camps

The Division offers camps for youth ages 5-12 during school breaks. In 2024, we offered a Thanksgiving Break, two weeks of Winter Break, Presidents Week and Spring Break. Camps take place at the Teen Room in the Arcata Community Center. The camp offers full-day care with extended care starting at 8 a.m. and ending at 5:30 p.m. at no additional charge. This successful camp enables registrants to participate in arts and crafts projects, games and activities. Revenue and participation totals vary year to year as the dates of the second week of Winter Break Camp fluctuate and dictate whether camp takes place before or after the New Year.

Art Camp

Budding artists gain exposure to a wide variety of art mediums including painting, ceramics, upcycling, book making and others as well as art history and theory. Campers bring home a plethora of unique art projects at the end of each week. Camps take place at the Arcata Community Center Teen Room and alternate throughout the nine weeks of summer between ages 4-6 and 7-9 years.

Birthday Parties

The Recreation Division offers a variety of Birthday Party options for families. Gymnastics themed birthday parties at the Judo Hut for youth 1-5 years and at the Arcata Community Center for youth ages 6 – 10 years. Play Center parties at the D St. Neighborhood Center are designed for youth ages 0-5 and are able to utilize an array of toys and activities from the Play Center program. In 2024, we introduced a Sports theme party option at the Arcata Community Center Gymnasium. All two-hour parties provide facility space, gymnastics, sports, and play equipment, supervision and fun, while the parent supplies the guests and refreshments. We offer families birthday celebrations with no stress or mess.

City Arts

City Arts is the umbrella name given to the variety of art programming offered by the Recreation Division. Our most popular art program is Family Ceramics which offers an intentionally affordable option for community members who might not otherwise be able to afford classes at a private studio. Participants learn a variety of hand building and glazing techniques making a variety of ceramic pieces. Sessions are offered throughout the year including a special Holiday Gift making workshop.



Explorer Science Camp - Laurel

This full day science-based camp for youth ages 5-9 years focused on S.T.E.A.M. projects (science, technology, engineering, art and Math) To better serve the Valley West community, camp took place on the Laurel Tree Charter School Campus on Valley East Blvd as well as utilizing Valley West Park and basketball court. In the summer of 2024 four weeks were offered with 25 campers enrolled each week.

First Year Playgroup

In partnership with First 5 Humboldt the Recreation Division provides programming that supports families with the transition into parenthood beginning with pregnancy through the first year of a child's life offering a developmentally responsive play environment designed for infants. First Year Playgroup is on Tuesdays, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Leader-In-Training

Leader-In-Training (L.I.T.), ages 13-17 years, work with youth ages 5-14 years, helping plan and lead activities, games and more. Registrants, gain firsthand work experience through the L.I.T. Program. Leaders-in-Training earn community service hours while acting as role models to our campers. Teens leave the program with job experience, professional references, and a summer of positive memories. All summer camps utilized the help of L.I.T.s. During the summer of 2024, there were more than 43 L.I.T.s, most of which served multiple weeks and multiple camps.

Jr. Explorer Science Camp Marsh and Forest

These camps offered at the Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center and Redwood Lounge focus on environmental educational lessons and emersion of campers into our local Marsh and Community Forest. Themes focused on local flora and fauna. Young Explorer Camps served youth ages 4-6 years. These were half day camps. Youth investigated the natural world through experiments, individual projects and engaging in science learning.



Play Center

In partnership with First 5 Humboldt, the Arcata Play Center offers a safe comfortable environment for families to meet and share parenting and play experiences with their infants/children up to five years of age. Play Center meets at the D Street Neighborhood Center Monday through Wednesdays from 10 a.m. – 12 p.m. Play Center was closed the last week of each month. A \$3 daily drop-in donation per child is requested but not required. Throughout the year, families are provided with resources addressing nutrition, car seat safety, health and wellness, parenting support and developmental stages. We offer engaging special events and themed days that help connect families to outside resources and provide new experiences. Examples include visits from the library for story time, touch-a-truck day with the Arcata Fire Department, Music Together, Halloween dress up, Friendsgiving, children's yoga and more!

Redwood Day Camp

The summer of 2024 brought Redwood Day Camp back in FULL SWING for the first time since the COVID shut down. Campers ages 5-12 took full advantage of the brand-new playground and beauty of Redwood Park playing games, creating crafts, singing camp songs, hiking the trails and more. We served upwards of 90 campers per week during the nine weeks of summer. Full day campers enjoy swimming at the Arcata Community Pool on Tuesdays and throughout the summer campers participate in a variety of walking field

trips including visiting the Cal Pol Natural History Museum and a Pirate scavenger hunt visiting several local businesses as well as other highlights. On Friday afternoons families are invited to join us for Redwood Round Up where campers perform skits and silly songs.

Skate Camp

Skate Camp provides a dynamic, inclusive environment for youth ages 6–12 to build skateboarding skills, make new friends, and express their personal style. This half-day camp emphasizes park safety, etiquette, and both street and vert riding techniques. In 2024, the City offered seven weeklong sessions, each nearly reaching the 20-camper maximum.

A continued partnership with AMPT Skate Shop supports staffing for the program and helps connect families with essential gear. In turn, campers are encouraged to support the local skateboarding community by shopping at AMPT for their equipment needs.

Contract Classes

The City partners with contracted instructors to deliver engaging specialty classes, with instructors receiving 60% of class revenue. The remaining 40% helps cover costs such as advertising, facility use, registration, and program administration.

In 2024, Matthew Olson continued his successful monthly Jujitsu program and the City expanded its offerings with the addition of two new classes: Pickleball and Chocolate Making Fun. Pickleball, taught by Enrique Esparza II, quickly became a community favorite. Over the course of the year, nine six-session courses were offered for both beginner and intermediate players, with multiple concurrent sessions regularly filling to capacity.

Chocolate Making Fun, led by Sandra Nakashima, a seasoned chocolatier with over 20 years of experience, also proved popular. Of the six two-hour workshops offered, five reached full enrollment. Participants learned to create a variety of handcrafted confections while gaining insight into chocolate-making techniques from a passionate and knowledgeable instructor.

Youth Development Scholarship Fund

The Youth Development Scholarship Fund provides a 30% fee reduction to youth from qualifying low-income families. The fund relies solely upon grants, donations, and fundraisers to provide this invaluable service to the community. During 2024, 51 youth participants received scholarships providing a total of \$5,505 in assistance. These children attended Gymnastics classes, Youth Basketball, and Summer Camps. In 2024, Humboldt Sponsors and Humboldt Area Foundation donated to this fund. Proceeds from The Holiday Craft Market also support the Youth Development Scholarship Fund.

Valley West Community Programming

The Environmental Community Services Division has worked to increase recreation programming, community development, beautification, and sense of place in the Valley West Community. This has included hosting pop-up recreational programming, implementing the Community's Participatory Budget priorities, working with several user groups to hold events at Carlson Park, partnering with CUNA on several projects and programs, implementing public art in Valley West Park, and facilitating community clean-up days.

In 2024, The Recreation Division focused on providing a full day summer camp option in the Valley West Community. In partnership with Laurel Tree School, the City provided Explorer Science Camp for four weeks. Playdates in the Park, an outdoor offering of Playgroup, was also offered at the newly opened Carlson Park. Additionally, the City secured a lease to explore development and programming at a Valley West Community Center.

Valley West Community Hoop Nights served as a free pop-up program aimed at teaching local youth some fundamental basketball skills and build camaraderie. Hosted at Valley West Park's Basketball court, this program offered two hours of basketball instruction on Monday and Wednesday evenings throughout September and averaged 6-10 participants each session.

Food Truck Fridays at Carlson Park was another Valley West pop-up program that featured music, a food vendor, and lawn games at the newly renovated Carlson Park. The first session coincided with the ribbon cutting ceremony for the park and attracted about 100 people.

GRANTS AND DONATIONS

PARKS AND FACILITIES DIVISION

The Parks & Recreation Divisions share the responsibility of renting City facilities and supporting community events, activities and tournaments. The Parks and Facilities Division maintains, prepares and supports activities scheduled at the City's buildings, parks and sports fields.

The Parks and Facilities Division responsibilities include design, development, landscaping and maintenance of Arcata's City parks and facilities. The Division maintains 30 open space areas totaling 106 acres. This system includes neighborhood and community parks, 15 playgrounds, nine athletic fields, special use and linear parks (tennis, skateboarding, bocce, pickle ball, greenways), non-motorized trail systems, family picnic areas, community gardens and farm, the downtown Plaza and open space areas. The Parks and Facilities division cleans and maintains City buildings and landscaping, parking lots, pedestrian corridors, roadway and sound-wall landscaping, and provides graffiti and illegally dumped solid waste abatement. Vandalism clean-up/ repair also falls to the Parks and Facilities Division.

- Redwood Park Playground and Pump Track completed in time for 2024 Summer Camp
- Carlson Park construction was completed, and a ribbon cutting ceremony held in September 2024
- The City continued design and site control for the Annie and Mary Trail that will eventually connect Arcata to Blue Lake along the historic Annie Mary Rail corridor. Construction is anticipated for 2025.
- The City completed a second Call for Public Art, which resulted in completion of a variety of art media and locations.
- City staff completed the Lorax and Jelly mountain bike trail segments in the Arcata Community Forest and the final segment of the Jump Trail will be completed in fall 2024
- Playground equipment was replaced at Windsong and Westwood Manor Parks
- Valley West Dog Park planning was completed, with construction anticipated for early 2025.
- Planning for transition of operation and management of the Bayside Park Farm was completed, and Centro del Pueblo is anticipated to step into this role in early 2025.
- Arcata Library ADA improvements construction began, with completion anticipated for early 2025.
- Arcata Ballpark construction began, with completion anticipated for May 2025.
- The City, in partnership with CUNA, held the second Valley West participatory budget process which prioritized programming in the Valley West Community.

Field Rentals and Use

The Parks Division maintains nine sports fields and courts that are used by a variety of groups for practice, tournaments, and league play in softball, baseball, soccer, ultimate frisbee, tennis, pickleball and bocce. The City operates four baseball/softball fields: The Arcata Ball Park, Sports Complex North and South and Pacific Union Park. Multi-use fields include the Pacific Union Field (two "under 12"/one full-size soccer) and the Sports Complex (two full-size fields/one "under 12").

The City accommodated 1,738.50 hours of field time in 2024. A wet spring pushed back some of the March and April field requests that came in, these requests were not reflected in "rainouts" which only occur once the fields are open to the public in the Spring. Often groups call in to check availability prior to submitting a written request and are informed it is already scheduled. This unmet need is not reflected in the table below. This year there were 0 rainouts.

Many organizations use the fields maintained by the City including: Humboldt Crabs, Arcata High School (AHS), Humboldt State University (HSU), College of the Redwoods, Mad River Softball Association (MRSA), Humboldt Soccer League (HSL), Eagles Baseball, Football Club Samoa, USTA/Humboldt Tennis, US Coast Guard, Temple Beth El, North Coast Preparatory Academy, Humboldt Fast Pitch Softball Association, Pacific Union School, and Mad River Youth Soccer League (MRYSL), Mad River United (MRYSL), Challenger Sports Soccer Camp, and Sequoia F.C.

Building Rentals and Use

The City provides seven buildings for rent: The Arcata Community Center, Redwood Lodge, Redwood Lounge, Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center, D Street Neighborhood Center, the Library Conference Room and the Judo Hut. The Parks and Facility Division maintains these buildings as well as City Hall, the Library, Transit Building, Arcata Resource Center and Public Works Annex.

During 2024, city buildings were used for many community and private events. Those events were held at the Arcata Community Center, Redwood Lodge, Library Conference Room, Redwood Lounge, Redwood Park Picnic Area, Larson Park Gazebo, D St. Neighborhood Center, and Judo Hut. City Hall and the Transit Center provide daily services to the community. In Fall of 2024, renovations took place in the library conference room to add a baby changing station and make other necessary ADA upgrades. The facility was blocked off to reservations at the end of October through the rest of the calendar year.

Table F shows the number of hours each facility was used, the revenue generated from building rentals and the number of people attending. For a complete breakdown of facility use by building, see Appendix 3.

Arcata Community Center

The Arcata Community Center was the site for many programs, activities, and community rentals this year. The facility experienced both new user groups and renters that reserve the space every year. NPA School used the gym on a weekly basis for their P.E. classes, other sports groups transitioned some of their outdoor activities inside during rainy months, and the Humboldt County Flea Market hosted an event once a month. The Recreation Division also held many classes and programs while other departments and joint-use partners used the building as well. The Senior Resource Center serves meals 4 days a week and offers a variety of senior activities. Some of the large events hosted at the community center this year include Seed Exchange, Godwit Days, Arcata High School Safe n' Sober, Fiber Fair, Humboldt County Mycology Fair, and Humboldt County Elections.

Special Events

Special Events are community-coordinated events at City parks and facilities. Special Event Permits are required for any event at a city park that requires road closures, or extra city services. The Recreation Division handles the permitting process and coordinates setup and maintenance with the Parks Division. The Parks Division is responsible for facility and park preparation, coordination electrical and water use, and facility/park clean up. The engineering department creates Traffic Control Plans for road closures while the Streets Division provides barricades and signage for the street closures. The Police Department may step up patrols in neighborhoods or in some cases assign officers to events.

Many of these events raise funds for local causes, non-profit agencies, or unique community needs. In addition to raising funds, special events such as Kinetic Sculpture Race and Fairy Festival give Arcata its unique flavor and attract many visitors annually. Other large events included the Arcata Bay Oyster Festival North Country Fair, July Fourth Jubilee, and the I Block Party. See Appendix 4 for a complete list of all Special Events in 2024.

Film Permits

The Recreation Division handles the film permitting process for the City of Arcata. This year there was a big Hollywood film that shot at multiple locations in Arcata. The film is called One Battle After Another and showcased big Hollywood stars such as Leonardo DiCaprio, Sean Penn, Benicio del Toro and Regina Hall. Film locations included an industrial complex on near West End Rd, Ralibertos Taqueria, and sections of highway 101 just north of Arcata. There was a large street closure for the Ralibertos filming location that shut down the roads in the area for an entire evening. Services were requested of APD and engineering provided traffic control plans for the street closures.

Vending Permits

The Recreation Division handles the vending permitting process for the City of Arcata. We have two separate distinctions with vending: Food truck vending and sidewalk vending. This year we had one food truck vendor permit for the D Street Neighborhood Center. This vendor operated for a total of 314 days in 2024. In 2024 there were the first authorized Sidewalk Vendors: Backwood Burritos and Peace Pops. Sidewalk vending permits accounted for \$30 of vending fees.



Bayside Park Farm

The Bayside Park Farm, which was the first CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) in Arcata, has provided the community with local and organic produce for over 30 years. The farm is funded by community shareholders who receive a weekly share of the harvest.

The Bayside Park Farm demonstrates sustainable farming practices. Over the years, this farm has supported many generations of student farmers who have moved on to become some of our area's notable farmers.

In 2024, the Farm supported 33 shareholders through the growing season (June through November). The Bayside Park Farm also offered winter "You-Pick" Shares (November through February), supporting 17 shareholders. In 2024, the Farm continued utilizing Interns as well as hosting Drop-In Volunteer Days. Bayside Park Farm donated 254 pounds

of food to Food for People for their Gleaning program which provides fresh produce to thousands of households in Humboldt County.

Collaborations and Community Partners

The success of many recreation and park activities would not be possible without assistance from long-standing community partners. During 2024, the Parks and Recreation Divisions collaborated with the following organizations:

Adopt-A-Park Program

Through the Adopt-A-Park program, community members and service groups volunteer their time and resources to perform weekly clean up, exotic species removal, tree planting, painting, building maintenance, and landscape beautification. All City parks are included in this program.

AMPT Skate Shop

AMPT Skate Shop partners with the City to staff, sponsor, and provide protective gear for youth during Skate Camp sessions at the Arcata Skate Park.

Arcata School District

Arcata Elementary School District is a strong supporter of Recreation Programs. The city renewed its MOU and heavily utilized the Sunny Brae gymnasium for the Youth Basketball League.

Arcata Chamber of Commerce

The Arcata Chamber of Commerce hosted many events this year including the annual Arcata Bay Oyster Festival, the July 4th Jubilee, Arts! Arcata, Sunday Art Markets and Trick or Treat on the Plaza. The Chamber also rents the Arcata Community Center to host their annual awards Dinner Banquet in February.

Arcata Library

The Arcata Library hosts many free community programs including monthly book clubs, books sales, knitting clubs, kids story time and collaborate with College of the Redwoods for an ESL free course to help teach English as a second language.

Cal Poly Humboldt

The Cal Poly Humboldt Sierra Club/Natural Resources Club continued their involvement performing trail renovation, tree planting, and exotic species removal. Our partnership with the Kinesiology and Recreation Administration Departments provides internships and special projects.

California Conservation Corps

The California Conservation Corps assisted with plantings and invasive species removal.

Changing Tides

Changing Tides Family Services provides training opportunities for childcare providers and those working with families with young children. Changing Tides supplements childcare fees for incoming qualifying families and refers families to city programs, primarily summer camps and break camps. In 2024, there was an increase in the number of families using Changing Tides to pay for summer camps and break camps.

Community Volunteer Supported Activities

To supplement the Arcata Community Center Building Supervisor staff there are numerous approved volunteers that assist with drop-in program activities like pickleball, table tennis, ukulele club and Hula

dancing. The youth basketball program would not be a success without the many volunteer parents and community members that step up to help coach the teams throughout our winter program. There are about 6 full time volunteers and about 45 seasonal volunteers for the YBB program.

Community United of North Arcata (CUNA)

CUNA believes that by focusing on community engagement and strategic collaboration, we can collectively work towards building a better represented Valley West. They have officially adopted Carlson Park and regularly host clean up days and other events onsite.

Cumbre Humboldt

Cumbre Humboldt financially supported Play dates in the park at the new Carlson Park playground as well as providing funding to send campers who reside in the Valley West community to attend our full day science camp.

First Five Humboldt

First Five Humboldt provides funding, educational and training resources, parent workshops and program staff support for the Arcata Play Center and First Year Playgroup.

Friends of the Arcata Marsh (FOAM)

FOAM works closely with the City to support educational opportunities at the Arcata Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary including staffing the Marsh Interpretive Center and leading Marsh tours for community and school groups.

Full Cycle

Full Cycle is a worker-owner bicycling powered community compost collection and processing company. Fully Cycle and the City have partnered to provide use of the Earth Tub Digester at Bayside Park Farm and compost collection services and processing to selected city programs.



Humboldt Area Foundation

Each summer, Humboldt Area Foundation generously supports the Recreation Division with a Summer Mini Grants \$1,000-\$1,500 grant to supplement our Youth Development Scholarship fund.

Humboldt County Office of Education

A group from the Humboldt County Office of Education assists with the maintenance of the City Hall parking lot, planters, and roundabouts.

Humboldt Crabs

The Humboldt Crabs continued their partnership and held a complete season. The Humboldt Crabs estimate that they have over 30,000 attendees annually.

Humboldt Sponsors

Each summer, Humboldt Sponsors generously supports the Recreation Division with a \$1,500-\$2,000 grant to supplement our Youth Development Scholarship fund.

Jacoby Creek School

Jacoby Creek School provides gymnasium space for recreation basketball between January and March. They are very helpful and flexible in the scheduling of the facility as we each work towards maximizing gym use during peak seasons. The cross country/track teams at Jacoby Creek School use fields at the Arcata Sports Complex for practices throughout the year and for the County Cross Country Championship in October.

Laurel Tree Charter School

In the summer of 2024 Laurel Tree Charter allowed the Recreation Division to utilize their campus for Explorer Science Camp. This partnership was important in that it allowed us to offer a full day camp in the Valley West Community.

Native Plant Society

Californian Native Plant Society volunteers continue to maintain the landscaping along the 7th Street walkway leading to the Arcata Community Center.

North Coast Community Garden Collaborative

The collaborative operates as a support network of and for community gardeners on California's north coast. The North Coast Community Garden Collaborative (NCCGC) works to bring community partners, gardens and gardeners together to improve access to affordable, healthy, fresh and culturally appropriate foods. NCCGC develops and delivers a monthly newsletter and provides community gardeners with opportunities for garden gatherings, educational events and sharing of resources.

Pacific Union School District

The Recreation Division is fortunate to receive time in the Pacific Union school gym for our basketball program. The Pacific Union Field is also utilized for Physical Education classes and PUSD hosts a cross-country race at the Arcata Marsh annually.

PacOut Green Team

The PacOut Green Team is a group of avid outdoors people in Humboldt County, CA that are passionate about keeping our outdoor spaces free of litter and debris. They have hosted numerous clean up events in City Parks and open spaces including Carlson Park, and the Arcata Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary.

Redwood Coast Mountain Bike Association

The City and Redwood Coast Mountain Bike Association (RCMBA) have an MOU and partner in mutually supporting bike trail development and maintenance. RCMBA played an integral role in the design of the Redwood Park Pump Track.

Senior Resource Center

In 2024 the Humboldt Senior Resource Center started served meals to the senior community out of the Senior Room located in the Arcata Community Center. Meals were served 4 times a week and serve as many as 40 individuals each day. Along with dining services, there are also senior activities and assistance programs the organization provides to participants.

Volunteer Trail Stewards

The Humboldt Trails Council serves as a unified voice to support development, maintenance, connection to, and use of trails for recreation and transportation throughout Humboldt County, California. Working with Site Coordinators, VTS hosts regular trail workdays in the Arcata Community Forest, Humboldt Bay Trail, and Marsh. Helping to improve recreational opportunities throughout Arcata.


